“ Our condolences to the families of Benny. I had great fun playing with Benny whenever we had family reunions at grandma Nolin's houses in Danville, IL and Tilton, IL. At the Tilton house, Benny got bucked off a pony and broke his arm in two different places. One 4th of July, we took carbide used in miner lanterns and put it in a metal syrup can of which we had made a hole in bottom the can. Thus we would spit on the carbide and close the lid of the can and then sit the can on the ground with the lid facing upward. We would lite a match and it hold near the hole at the bottom of the syrup can. It would blow the lid of the can way up in the air. Once at the Maple St home in Danville, us boys walked up north of the house to the river by the railroad tracks and then we all went swimming in the nude. The last time I saw Benny was when my wife and I met Benny and his wife Maxine along with his sister Rita and her husband Jerry in Orlando, FL on a Mother's Day a few years ago.
